STATISTICS RECORDED IN 2022:

6516 Potential victims identified in the UK in 2022

From 99 different nationalities

8387 Referrals were made and signposted

2588 cases of modern slavery

Exploitation types ranged from – Trafficking, Modern Slavery, Debt bonded, organ Harvesting, CCE, CSE, Forced Labour and Forced or Early Marriage.

CASE STUDY

A is a young man who was trafficked to the UK in 2019 and presented ni Bristol alone aged 13yrs old. He had suffered significant trauma both in his country of origin and during his journey to the UK.

He has lived in our children's home and during this time we have supported him with his recovery through trauma and successfully navigate transitions through school to college.

He has strong ties to his ethnic community and has developed a network of support from both the carers in the home and his community.

In late 2022 he passed his moped test, and he began to express a desire to gain employment, indicating to carers that he had acquaintances who were working using the names of other people. Shortly after this carers observed a change in his routine, he became less communicative with carers, regularly bringing takeaway food home that carers had not given money for, and when carers expressed curiosity he became defensive and began to express behaviours that were uncommon for him.

CONCERNS

NEW PATTERNS IN HIS ROUTINE

RETURNING LATE MOST NIGHTS

WITHDRAWAL FROM CARERS

STOPPED ENGAGING IN USUAL ACTIVITES AND EDUCATION

NOT RESPONDING TO CARERS WHILST AWAY FROM THE HOME

DEFENSVIE WHEN CARERS SHOWED CURIOSOTY

RELUCTANT TO ENGAGE WITH CARERS, SHOUTING, LASHING OUT, BLAMING STATEMENTS, THREATS NOT TO RETURN HOME, RUDE TO CARERS.

ITEMS AND TAKEAWAYS THAT COULD NOT BE ACCOUNTED FOR AND DID NOT APPEAR IN CONTEXT TO MONIES AVAILABLE TO HIM

DEBT BONDED – possible forced to work to repay traffickers.
