

Who is most at risk of being reported missing?



In 2022, over 12,000 children in care went missing in over 76,500 missing incidents. Repeat missing incidents account for **more than 50% of all reports** received by police forces in the UK

Exploitation

- **7** in **10** young people who have been sexually exploited have also been reported missing

- 1 in 7 of the children who completed Return
 Interviews with Missing People had been sexually
 exploited and nearly 1 in 10 had been criminally
 exploited.


Mental health

 - 1 in 5 children who completed Return Interviews with Missing People disclosed information about mental health issues

- 1 in 10 was at risk of self-harm
- 4% were at risk of suicide



Risks whilst missing





Finding balance in reporting

Under-reporting

- Young people left at risk
- No access to return interview leading to misunderstanding risks/ reasons for repeat
- Adultification?



Over-reporting

- Feel being treated differently to other young people
- Damaging relationship with staff
- Too much police contact
- Potential criminalisation



Prevention Good practice - Philomena Protocol

Preventing missing and finding missing young people more quickly by compiling with a young person:

- Likely triggers for going missing (and how to prevent those happening)
- What will happen if they disappear
- Staying in touch ground rules
- Whether they've gone missing before and what happened where they were found
- Risks they face
- Physical description + photos





Safety Planning

What you would do, and who might help, in a crisis.

Can include:

- Distraction techniques for moments of overwhelm
- Where safe/ unsafe places are
- Who you can contact to get safe



Ofsted

- Ofsted, the regulatory body in England, conducts inspections of various care settings, including children's homes and daycare providers.
- Ofsted reports directly to parliament, parents, carers, and commissioners.
- Ofsted inspects Children's homes based on the Social Care Common Inspection Framework (SCCIF).
- Full report of the findings will be published on the Ofsted reports website within a maximum of 38 working days from the end of the inspection.

Findings from police and local authority data, 2021-22










Over-representation of Black children in missing incidents




Length of time children are missing

- Black children are less likely to be found by the police
- Black children are less likely to have risk factors identified and recorded in relation to their missing episodes

Reasons for missing

- Home life, including family conflict and feeling unsafe at home
- Experiencing a lack of belonging, identity and acceptance
- Exploitation and risks outside the home

"I don't think that Black children are given the space to be themselves in this society, in this culture"

"He's looking, he's just looking for somewhere to belong. And his crook friends make him feel like he belongs. And he hasn't had that acceptance [anywhere else]"





"It's almost like a forgotten person. It's like they're forgotten about, and it's not taken seriously. It's not taken seriously as other people who have gone missing, who are not Black."

"We're overlooked. Basically. Like, just...yeah, being overlooked, not being listened to, not being understood"

Responses when Black children go missing

- Sense of being valued less, and that this impacted the response
- Poor coverage in the media
- Stereotyping, adultification, criminalisation
- Emotional wellbeing and neurodiversity







