Inspection Top Tips Restrictions

Children are treated with dignity & respect. There are no unnecessary restrictions in place around time with family, friends and other people who are important to them.

Restrictive practice is used only when necessary to protect the child and/or those around them and must be proportionate. All incidents are recorded, reviewed and monitored by leaders. The views of the child, dependent on their age and understanding, are sought and understood.

"Children do not have access to all areas of their home. All doors are locked, including to the kitchen area. This is used as a restrictive measure to manage behaviours and not to ensure the safety of children. One child has a court directed order in place. However, managers and staff have not considered how the restrictions they have imposed in the home have impacted on the privacy and liberties of the other child. CCTV and door locks are used as part of day-to-day care practice, without an understanding that the court directed order is a permissible order, when the child is in crisis."

Positive environments where children can flourish

- Staff understand children in context of their history
- Adults are skilled & confident in finding the best ways to keep children safe: ways that promote their rights, respect their dignity & help equip them for the future
- Ofsted will set out to **question and understand** any type of physical intervention or restriction, such as restrictions on movement and intrusive observations
- Effective assessments and plans, spotting the signs early, offering positive relationships, new experiences & opportunities to widen choices children can make
- "A risk-averse culture does not support children to develop their potential"
