# What is a Bystander?

- Is a witness to a situation
- Is not directly involved not the victim or wrongdoer\*
- Can make a decision to get involved or not
- \*Note we choose to use victim to mean a recipient of harmful behaviour and wrongdoer as the perpetrator

# Active v Passive Bystanders

Passive bystander:

does nothing

Can intervene to stop events before they happen

Preventing a potential outcome



Active/prosocial bystander: intervenes

Can intervene while an event is occurring

Dealing with an outcome


All had passive bystanders who witnessed emotional/physical /sexual abuse/bullying and did **NOTHING** 




#### Where we are now:

healthy and positive behaviour is in the majority.





# Bystander Interventions
